Evette Avila Superintendent of Schools District residents will go to the polls on Tuesday, May 16th to vote on a proposed \$125,850,000 budget for the 2023-2024 school year. With the proposed tax levy at 0.92%, the budget requires a simple majority for approval. We have worked diligently to develop a fiscally responsible, balanced budget that supports educational programs, accounts for rising costs, preserves an adequate fund balance and is mindful of the

financial impact to taxpayers, while at the same time ensuring the stability and the long-term health of our schools. The proposed budget will provide numerous extracurricular activities, athletic programs and continue to provide culturally inclusive educational programs and services that meet the needs of all our students.

This year, the voters will consider multiple propositions. Proposition 1 is the yearly budget. Proposition 2 and Proposition 3 are capital project propositions. Proposition 2 focuses on health and safety, including new security vestibules, necessary facility upgrades, and improvements at each school at no tax impact to the community. Proposition 3 includes renovations to the science classrooms at the High School and technology classrooms at the Middle School, additional renovations at Berea Elementary school that will relocate the main office and Kindergarten classrooms to provide for

enhanced security, upgrades to the library at Montgomery Elementary School, and additional facility upgrades at other District buildings. Proposition 2 must pass in order for Proposition 3 to pass. These capital project improvements will enhance our students' learning environment, address security and safety concerns, and benefit the community for years to come. Since the District receives approximately 76% building aid on eligible project expenses and will utilize reserve funds and fund balance, both capital project propositions totaling \$46,595,000 are estimated to cost the average homeowner less than \$2.00 per month. Proposition 4 will establish a new capital reserve which can be funded up to \$15,000,000 for up to 10 years. This new reserve will help the District save for future capital expenditures.

We have accomplished a great deal this year. District administrators, faculty and staff have worked to provide the best possible instructional programs and extracurricular opportunities for all of our students. We again look forward to an exciting summer school program this year, across all grade levels, for both enrichment and to address learning loss due to the pandemic that some of our students have experienced.

At Valley Central, we work diligently every day to create a school district that the community can be proud of – a great place for children. Thank you for your continued support of our students, faculty and families. Please remember to vote on Tuesday, May 16th, from 6:00 a.m. to 9:00 p.m. at Valley Central High School.

PROGRAM COMPONENT: \$101,654,761 **PERCENTAGE OF BUDGET: 81%**

The program component provides funding for the salaries and benefits of all teachers, guidance counselors, aides, monitors, psychologists, nurses, social workers, and speech therapists. The program component also includes the costs associated with all the instructional and extra-curricular programs, transportation and athletic activities.

CAPITAL COMPONENT: \$13,124,362 PERCENTAGE OF BUDGET: 10%

The capital component provides funds for the operation and maintenance of Valley Central's school buildings, debt service, property tax refunds, tax certiorari and court-ordered costs, and the salaries and benefits for the maintenance and custodial staff.

ADMINISTRATIVE COMPONENT: \$11,070,877 PERCENTAGE OF BUDGET: 9%

The administrative component provides funding for the overall general support and management activities of the district, including the salaries and benefits of all professional members who spend 50 percent or more of their time in administration and supervision, curriculum development, clerical staff, public information, business office operations, and legal and auditing services.

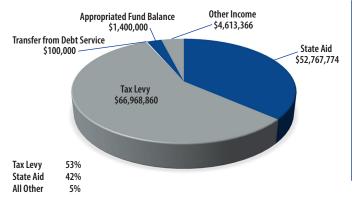

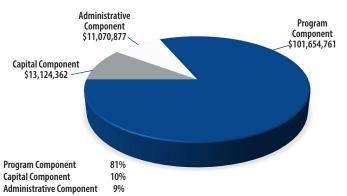

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2023-2024 PROPOSED BUDGET

THERE WILL BE FOUR PROPOSITIONS ON THE BALLOT

Proposition #1: The Proposed 2023-2024 Budget
Proposition #2: Renovation/reconstruction of district building facilities
Proposition #3: Additional renovation/reconstruction of district building facilities (Proposition 3 is dependent on the passage of Proposition 2)
Proposition #4: Establishment of Capital Reserve Fund 2023

TRANSFER TO CAPITAL CAPITAL OUTLAY PROJECT

The proposed budget includes a transfer of \$500,000 to the capital fund for a capital outlay project. Capital outlay projects allow for repair needs to be addressed without incurring borrowing costs. The capital outlay project included in the 2023-2024 budget includes resurfacing of the high school track. After years of wear, the track's rubberized coating is deteriorating. This restoration will extend the life of the track.

The source of the funds for these projects is fund balance. Passage of the school budget constitutes an approval of a transfer of general fund monies to the capital fund in the amount of \$500,000 for the capital outlay project together with necessary furnishings, machinery, apparatus, appurtenances, and incidental improvements and expenses in connection therewith.





The track is used by our Modified and Varsity Track teams and is enjoyed by the community. Visible cracking is prevalent across many areas of the track.

The estimated budget impact to Valley Central for the 2023-2024 year is \$538,862 and is included in the proposed budget.

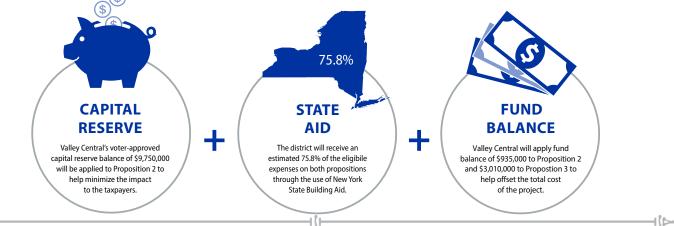
To enhance building security, Proposition 2 will create security vestibules at all schools. This will provide a double set of doors with an enclosed greeter window within the vestibule for personnel to check visitor credentials before allowing entry.



The boilers within several school buildings are beyond their useful life and require a complete replacement.



This project will replace the tennis courts at Valley Central High School as two of the six courts are shut down due to cracking and deterioration of the court surface. This replacement will provide a safe, level playing surface for athletes, physical education classes, and community use.

PROPOSITION 3 CAN ONLY BE ENACTED IF IT PASSES AND PROPOSITION 2 ALSO PASSES

The total maximum cost for both propositions is \$46,595,000 which is estimated to cost the average homeowner less than \$2 per month. Currently, the District receives 75.8% building aid on eligible project expenses. If approved, the district would use \$9,750,000 from the District's Capital Reserve and \$3,945,000 from fund balance to reduce the impact on taxpayers.

These classrooms will be renovated to better reflect the rapid changes in technology, align with New York State Technology Standards, and provide flexible spaces that support 21st century learning.

PROPOSITION 4 ESTABLISH A NEW CAPITAL RESERVE FUND 2023

Establish the VCSD Capital Reserve Fund 2023 with a cap of \$15 Million to expire in ten years.

The 2019 Capital Reserve Fund was established with a limit of \$10 Million which is being expended for Capital Project- Proposition #2 to cover the local share of the project. Since it would be expended, the district would need a new Capital Reserve Fund to continue to save funds for future Capital Projects.

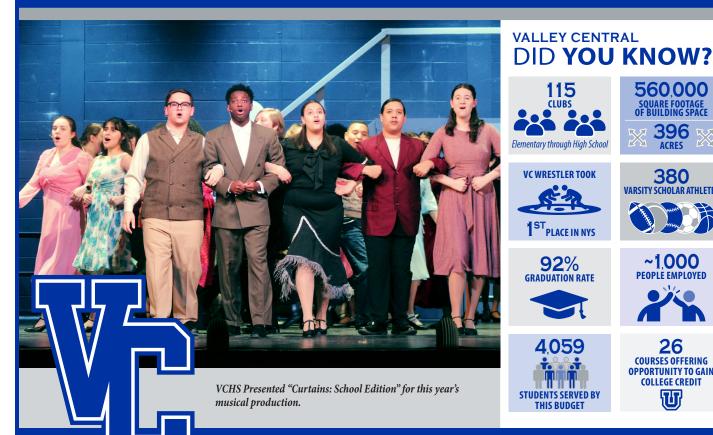
